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Most Russians I know they do not like or support human suffering in this war, but they do support advancing Russian interests. They certainly do not agree with giving up the Crimean peninsula to NATO.

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This is a reality check. Ukraine is collateral damage in this conflict between Russia and NATO countries. Russia is simply breaking Ukraine for its efforts to antagonize Russia and for threats to side with Russia's strategic enemy. US would have done the same to Cuba or Mexico if they were antagonizing the US and were threatening to host Russian military bases. Yes, war is terrible because people suffer. But this is what people usually do at war. So it is our common goal to maintain balance of interests to ensure there is no reason to go to war. If you poke a tiger with a stick long enough, tiger bites.

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Interesting fact is that Crimea was first owned by Turkey, then by Russia, then by Ukraine. So, from historic justice perspective, Turkey should be the one concerned about Crimea, not Ukraine. If Ukraine feels entitled to own what was once Turkish land, so does Russia.

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Michael Hotchkiss G7 countries is only 33% of world's GDP. Russia can sell its oil and oil distillate products to the rest of the world. Distribution channels will have to be adjusted at some extra cost, though. G7 countries can buy "approved" oil elsewhere at premium (undiscounted) market prices, driving their economies further into recession. We will have to wait for Dec 5th and see how this plays out ;-)
